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beyond 60 and as a final act of Police betrayal, the officers in charge set another limit of 100 before the march would proceed. By now, further reports were coming in of members trying to reach the starting off point. The B.M.'s local leaders asked for permission to escort these young Britons up but this was denied.

#### BUT ASIANS WERE ALLOWED TO MARCH

If those young Britons had any doubts about their place in current British society, such doubts were dispelled when it was heard that on that same day, in this same town Asian Left-wingers had earlier marched with a Police escort. These Asian marchers numbered about sixty coloureds.

It was purely on account of Asian and Left-wing threats of violence that Dewsbury was heavily policed at tremendous cost to the British ratepayers and to add insult to injury, these Marxists and their coloured Red Guards demanded that the cost of policing this non-event should be charged to the British Movement.

#### A BRADFORD MEMBER REPORTS

Kevin Watmough from Bradford said "The Police were disgusting. Many of our supporters weren't allowed near the park where we were to set off from. On the way to the railway station, one of our lads was punched in the face in a surprise attack by a red freak. Policemen saw this but did nothing yet when we taunted Reds with anti-Communist salutes, the Police told us to stop or we would be arrested for behaviour

#### POLICE TURN A BLIND EYE TO MARXIST VIOLENCE AND INTIMIDATION

Steve Frost reports that when the Movement's members having been split into groups by the Police, arrived at the station, the place was besieged by Marxists and Asians and the the Movement's members were met with a hail of abuse, threats, spitting and missiles. Yet, the only people warned about their conduct WAS US. The Reds were allowed to walk up to us and taunt us and only when I told the Police the obvious, that this could only lead to violence, were they removed.

Alex Baron from Leeds, said: "With regard to Press blackouts and lies, everything you have said is true and I mean, everything. At this event, the Left-wing Press turned up and grinned at us, shutters on cameras. Only when the Police said that we couldn't march did they peel those shutters off and started to take their pictures. And the big papers ignored us. Those that could not ignore us; The Yorkshire Evening Post, Leeds Radio, Telegraph and Argus (Bradford) etc, printed lies, pure lies. We were there. There was lots of support but we were betrayed by the Police. And the cute observations by one paper saying that in future such marches should not be allowed as they wasted taxpayers money when they flop - lies all lies. I know because I was one of those who were there."
