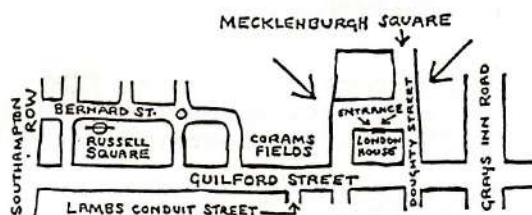

THE SPEAKERS

Bill Thompson is a part time teacher. He did his Masters degree in Family and Womens History and is currently completing his Ph.d on the "moral majority" in Britain at the University of Essex.

Ted Goodman is a Solicitor and Legal Advisor to David Webb's National Campaign for the Reform of the Obscene Publications Acts (NCROPA). He has written for a number of publications, including The Freethinker and is the co-editor of the forthcoming book Britain: An Unfree Country. He is also a member of both the Libertarian Alliance and the National Council For Civil Liberties.

Christie Davies is Professor of Sociology at the University of Reading. He is the author of a number of books, including Permissive Britain: Social Change in the 60s and the 70s, Wrongful Imprisonment, and The Reactionary Jokebook. He also co-edited, with Rajeev Dhavan Censorship and Obscenity. He is also a member of the Advisory Council of the Libertarian Alliance.

Antony Grey has been involved in campaigning for individual freedom in private life, thought, speech and publication for over 30 years. He was Secretary of the Homosexual Law Reform Society (which fought successfully for the 1967 Sexual Offences Act) and has been an executive committee member of the NCCL and the Defence of Literature and the Arts Society (now the Campaign Against Censorship). He has written on the relationship between pornography and crime and his essay "Sex and the Law" appeared in Vol 3, No. 1 of the LA's journal Free Life.

Mary Hayward is the Honorary Secretary of the Campaign Against Censorship.
