The first of our hands was played live at the World Series in July 2010; the other two are much more recent. In the live game, Matt Affleck has pocket aces while his opponent has pocket jacks. Jacks are generally regarded as a difficult hand to play, but heads up, aces are around 4-1 favourite against a smaller pair.

Here there was action before the flop; both players overplayed their hands, but Affleck was still ahead after the turn. And was gutted by the river card, which made his opponent a straight , busting Affleck out of the tournament. Don't feel too sorry for him though, because he won around half a million dollars for finishing in 15<sup>th</sup> place!




Quad 6s river jacks in a high stakes cash game

The next hand is from an on-line game on the world's biggest poker site, and sees jacks lose this time; he and the other player had both flopped sets. If you flop a set at hold 'em you are probably ahead, the important word here being probably. Clearly, the guy with the 6s thought he would pick up a nice pot in this high stakes cash game – yes, that really is \$2,710 in the pot. No doubt his heart sank when his opponent showed a set of jacks. Guess whose heart sank next?

Finally, from high stakes cash to micro-stakes tournaments; this 7 card stud hand was played on Betfair in the small hours of Sunday, June 14. The guy with the 8s was rolled up, and after 5<sup>th</sup> street, his opponent needed a miracle. Who says miracles don't happen? The final screengrab shows where this player finished in the tournament. He won't be giving up the day job just yet.
