The Women's Idiocy Party

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In July, a new political party was formed in the UK, at least that is what it represents itself as. As for education, in 2012/3, women outnumbered men in higher education, and this is a trend.

It is clear then that at least two of the above goals are specious. While no reasonable person would condone violence against women, this is not really a party political issue but a law and order one. Getting women out of low paid jobs is also admirable, provided these same jobs are not simply to be handed to men. Do men and women really want shared care-giving, whatever that means? And as for equal representation in the media, is she serious? Here is the reality:

"Most journalists are women. Most authors are women. Most teachers, lab technicians, therapists, editors, librarians, public relations officers and insurance underwriters are women."

Finally, why should there be more women in company boardrooms? Public limited companies should be accountable in the final analysis to their shareholders.
