Explore the streets of 1960s London through the eyes of eminent photographer Dorothy Bohm.

This display of over 30 photographs reflects the diversity of London in the 1960s, focusing on people from all walks of life, from schoolchildren to fashion-conscious young adults and market traders.

Born in East Prussia in 1924, Dorothy Bohm moved to Lithuania in 1932 with her family to escape the threat of Nazism. Bohm was sent by her parents to safety in Britain in 1939, armed with a Leica camera handed to her by her father at the very last moment. London has been her home since the 1950s.

Dorothy Bohm has since worked as a photographer all around the world. She was closely involved in the founding of the Photographers' Gallery in London in 1971 and was elected an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society in 2009.
