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THE THIRD SEASON, 1958-59

Once again it is our pleasure to welcome playgoers to the opening of a new season at the Playhouse. This year the special importance that always attaches to these occasions is increased by the presence of Dirk Bogarde and Hermione Baddeley, who are leading the company in our first play. For both it is a return to the stage after several years away; we hope they will enjoy their work here as much as Oxford enjoys the chance of seeing them.

The choice of another Anouilh to open a season is accidental, though the theatre has cause to be grateful to this master of playwriting: for it was his "Dinner with the Family" which helped largely to pull the Playhouse out of a very uncomfortable corner last year, and clear the way for the comparative stability we now enjoy. "Jezebel" is an earlier play, and altogether different in mood. Students of Anouilh will no doubt be interested to notice the number of famous 'trademarks' to be found in it; but for most people the strength and force of the writing and the tremendous scope of the roles will be more important.

Later plans for the season include the world premiere of a play by William Cooper, based on the famous Japanese romance "Prince Genji". With its variety of settings and costumes, not to mention the number of specially made stools, scrolls, desks, cushions, writingbrushes and other out-of-the-way properties, this looks like being the most elaborate and costly Playhouse production so far: though the Revuc, scheduled for after Christmas, and Minos Volanakis's production of "The Bacchae", which follows it, will not come far behind.

On October 6th, for one week, Anthony Knowles and Andrew Broughton are presenting Terence Rattigan's lastest play, "Variations on a Theme". Written for Margaret Leighton, this is a modern version of "The Lady of the Camelias", set in the South of France. On October 13th the Playhouse Company returns with "Waiting for Godot", Samuel Beckett's famous play, directed by Harold Lang.
