CEREMONY OF BEATING RETREAT

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE ORIGIN OF THE CEREMONY

THE ORIGIN of this ceremony is very obscure, but it is doubtless one of the earliest to be instituted in the Army. It is mentioned under the title of "Watch Setting" in the "Rules and Ordynaunces for the Warre" dated 1554.

Originally the call was beaten by drums alone. At a later date fifes and then bugles were introduced. The present ceremony, which frequently includes a band, is a comparatively modern innovation.

In times gone by darkness put an end to the fighting for the day, and so the object of the call was to collect the necessary guards for the camp for the night. In addition it was a warning to all those still outside to retire to the protection of the camp.

There is some confusion between "Retreat" and "Tattoo," as the French used the word "Retraite" to indicate a similar call to our "Tattoo," but it is fairly certain that "Retreat" is quite separate from "Tattoo" and was always meant to be beaten at sunset.

In the General Orders of the Duke of Cumberland a distinction is made between the two ceremonies; "The Retreat is to beat at Sunset," whereas "Tattoo [is] to beat at ten [nine or eight] o'clock at night."

In 1799 General Regulations and Orders for the Conduct of H.M. Armed Forces in Britain laid down that "Retreat shall be beaten at Sunset," and this is repeated in all editions of King's/Queen's Regulations down to the present day.
